(taught Summer 2012, UCSD, Department of Communication COSF 130, class size: 8)

Description:

This class is about Technology, History and how they both relate to what we like to call Progress. We will cover electronic media progress from the mid 19th to early 21st centuries and how it structures and is structured by our dreams of the future.

Requirements:

- Quizzes 5 in-class reading quizzes. They will be given at random during the class period. Possible question types: multiple choice, matching, fill in the blank, short answer, short essay.
- Ontology Paper (two pages) You must pick one electronic medium and describe its ontology/ form: what is it; how does its form matter; how does it relate to other media; etc.
- Final Exam in-class final exam. Extended quiz with full essay.
